Hi Joan

Thanking you for the information does not even begin to tell you how I feel. My Mother, Ethel Marie Scott Daugherty, is the spitting image of Annie. Most of the Scott siblings look like her. My Mom had black hair, short, always wore it up like Annie. Now, I guess I'm getting closer to seeing where the looks came from. The sad thing is, I could not copy the pictures for some reason. I sent them to my nephew in Houston and a cousin in Mo., and asked that they copy and send me what they could via snail mail.

Did Annie have Hazel eyes? My Dad used to say Mom had Indian blood in her, and Mom would say it was the Welsh or Scottish blood.

This is all I have so far. It has taken me thirty years for this much, but I will gladly send you whatever I keep finding.

According to the 1880 Mt. Carmel, Fleming Co., census, it has William Tucker being born in 1841. It lists the family as follows: All being born in Ky.

WILLIAM TUCKER, 1841

AMANDA , wife, 1835 (I don't know if this was Annie's mother or not. I have a scribbled paper from my Aunt Pearl that says Annie was 18

when her father remarried, but this is really hard to read.

1. ANNIE E., born 1863 (a different date than yours)
2. Mary B., born 1868
3. Millie Jane, born 1869 (Millie was born 1868. It is written in the obit of my Grand

father, Oliver Scott. Millie was my grandmother)

My Aunt Pearl talked about Uncle Abner Tucker also. I found him in the 1880, Mason

Co., Ky., census. However, I can find nothing relating him to William or Annie)

So far, I don't have a thing on William, but I think I will look into the Virginia C.W. pages and try to find him.

I have William being born around Braken Co., and Millie being born around Louisville, so I am guessing that is where Annie was born.

The only member I have true knowledge of is Millie Jane, born May 23, 1868, near Louisville. She married Oliver Scott, born March 25, 1861, Lima,

Adams Co., Illinois.

Oliver and Millie married in Ohio, because their fathers were still enemies after the Civil War where they fought on opposite sides.

The last 5 were born in Carl Junction, Mo.

Oliver Scott died April 23, 1913, and Millie J. Tucker Scott died May 14, 1913. My Mother, Ethel was eleven when her parents died, so that is why information was hard to come by. I am getting it second and third hand. I do have places of burial for almost all the children if you wish.

I would love to have copies of any receipts pertaining to Annie.

I am thrilled to get your info. It inspires me to work on the Tucker line. I just phoned my mom, who is 82. She says that all she remembers about Annie is grey hair pulled back in a little bun. I can print the photos for you and mail them. I'll also send copies of the other things you requested. I'll need your address. Mine is Joan Mickler, 1203 West Edgewood, Friendswood, TX 77546. My phone is 281 482 7133. Friendswood is between Houston and Galveston - near NASA. Thomas and Annie lived in Field Store, Tx near Waller. They are both buried at Field Store. This community is about 50 miles northwest of Houston. We have periodic reunions of their descendants - there are lots of us in the area. I'm interested in your birth date info. My mother has kept saying that Annie was only 18 when she married Thomas and came to Texas. I got my birth date from some work that my dad did on genealogy in the 1930's. So .. did dad make a mistake, possibly. I'm inspired to begin work - after the holidays.

OLIVER SCOTT & MILLIE JANE TUCKER

born March 26, 1861

Oliver was the son of Wiseman Scott. Wiseman was born Oct. 1, 1824, near Claysville, Harrison Co., Ky. Wiseman was the son of James Scott and Sarah Hitch. Records show me that Elizabeth Higbie, who married Wiseman, 1858, Adams Co., Illinois, is the Mother of Oliver. However, in Oliver's obit, someone listed Lucinda Nash as Oliver's Mother. Wiseman is buried in the Dayton National Cemetery, Dayton, Ohio. He died there at the Old Soldier's Home Feb. 29, 1904. He was in the Civil War, enlisted in Quincy, Illinois, and fought on the union side.

Oliver married Millie March 25, 1890, Aberdeen, Ohio. My Aunt Estelle, who would dwell on the past, did tell me this story. Great Grandfathers Wiseman and William hated each other so much, because of the Civil War, the forbid Wiseman and Millie to court. Oliver used to take a boat across the river and meet Millie in the woods for their courting. If this is true, it is such a true love story. And to think, they both died so young. Oliver and Millie had a farm in Bracken Co., Ky. Oliver and Millie belonged to the Methodist Church in Germantown, Bracken Co., Ky. I don't know why they moved there. Oliver worked for the Frisco Rail Road in Carl Junction. Mom said he had a contagious disease, and went quickly. Oliver's obit says he died from typhoid malaria. He is buried in the Carl Junction Cemetery, Mo.

Millie, by her picture was a beautiful woman. Mom said she could do anything, and in her short time on earth, she was a good person. She died of the same thing Oliver had, and they would not let her body go to the funeral home. I have tried to get her obit, but cannot find a thing. When I was back there in 2001 for my Hensley reunion, I spent most time with my brother Dewey in Miami, Ok. and did not have time to go to the newspaper. I have written to the paper, but still have no info. I did go to the cemetery, and Oliver, Millie, and the two babies do not have a headstone. If only I were rich to finally put one up. However, Aunt Estelle bought a family plot, and it is cemented around. With my other pictures, I will send you a copy. Mom said Uncle Charley had the same disease, but Aunt Pearl kept him in cold water,

and brought his temperature down and he survived. Mom also said she could hardly wait for each spring because her Dad, Oliver, would butcher a pig. They would take the stomach, correct me if I'm wrong about the body part, and fill it with sand and have a great time playing ball. Millie was a great cook and a super seamstress.

ESTELLE SCOTT

Aunt Estelle led a colorful life in her younger days. She was married several times with no children. She lived in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, with her husband ? Roscoe at the time of death of her parents. Estelle had a brief encounter with the silent movies in her youth. She was a beautiful and elegant woman. After Millie died, Estelle took Mom, Aunt Evelyn, and I believe two others to her home in Chicago where she did raise them with fine southern manners. Mom and Aunt Pearl learned how to cook and sew from Estelle. Aunt Estelle was a tailor like her grandfather, Wiseman. Estelle, in her later years used to come and spend a lot of time in Oregon with us. She also lived in Mills Orchard, Ca., along with Pearl and our family. Estelle finally settled in Oklahoma City and she was a tailor for the senators, congressmen, etc., at the capital. Mom, Dad and I flew back to OK City when she got ill. Dewey Jr., and his wife Lois took her to their home in Quapaw, OK, and she remained there until her hospital stay where she died, Dec. 17, 1980. She is buried in the Carl Junction Cemetery. She shares a headstone with her brother, Charley Calbert.

Ron just got home, so I will continue on after he goes back to work. Ron is retired but he is working full time for the Vancouver School driving bus. We are raising three grandsons, 8, 13, 15, so he had to go back to work. These are my step-grandsons, and I love them dearly.

ADMIRAL DEWEY DAUGHERTY

10/05/1899--07/11/1988

Dunneagan, Polk Co., Mo.

2nd child of

EDWARD VENSON DOUGHERTY (note the spelling - we are the "A", the rest of the clan is "O". Edward was born in Illinois 12/24/1875. Died 01/25/1929. First buried in Uncas Cemetery, and all was moved to the IOOF Cemetery in Ponca City, OK, when the built a dam.

MARY SUSAN OCTAVY HENSLEY DOUGHERTY was born 12/02/1876 near Bolivar, Polk Co., Mo. Died 11/24/1961 in Ponca City, OK. She is buried in Ponca City at the IOOF cemetery also, and her remains were moved there also.

This is a very interesting story. It came from your 3rd, I believe, cousin, Larry Henderson in Versailles, Mo. This is a story about the real Admiral in which my Daddy was named after.

ADMIRAL GEORGE DEWEY

George Dewey (1837-1917), American naval officer, who became a hero during the Spanish-American War where the U.S. fleet he commanded destroyed the Spanish fleet at Manila.

Dewey was born on December 26, 1837, in Montpelier, Vermont, and educated at the U.S. Naval Academy, from which he graduated in 1858. At the outbreak of the American Civil War, he was commissioned a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy. In 1862, in command of the sloop "MISSISSIPPI", Dewey took part in the successful operation led by Admiral David Farragut to capture New Orleans, Louisiana. Dewey was promoted to the rank of commander in 1872, captain in 1884, and commodore in 1896. In November 1897, he was given command of the Asiatic Squadron of the U.S. Navy.

When the United States declared war on Spain on April 25, 1898, Dewey's squadron was in the port of Hong Kong. The following day he was ordered to "CAPTURE OR DESTROY THE SPANISH SQUADRON", then believed to be based in Manila. On May 1, he engaged the Spanish fleet in Manila Bay after giving the famous command to the Captain of his flagship: "YOU MAY FIRE WHEN READY, GRIDLEY." Dewey forcefully defeated an attempt by German naval vessels in the bay to interfere with his operations; he completely destroyed the Spanish fleet without the loss of a single American and with only eight men wounded. Six days later Dewey was made a rear Admiral. On August 13, he aided General Wesley Merritt in capturing Manila. In further recognition of his services, Dewey was promoted (1899) to the special rank of Admiral of the Navy, and Congress passed a special act to enable him to continue in active service past the legal retirement age. He also served as president of the General Board of the U.S. Navy from 1900 until his death in Washington D.C., on January 16, 1917.

That is the story behind the famous name. However, the government did turn Dad's name around so there would be no confusion. He papers then read, Dewey Admiral Daugherty.

My Daddy tried to enlist in WW2, my Mom said, but he had too many kids, so he became a Civil Service worker, and the U.S. Navy sent him overseas to work on the war ships. He was a boiler maker, pipe fitter, welder.

My gosh, I did not realize we were so close in the family ladder. Four years ago, I met a "Hensley" cousin on the net, and I flew to KS, and we drove down to the Hensley reunion in Nevada, Mo. I met about 120 cousins I never knew existed. I have been back, and love seeing my "cousins". The funny thing was, I called my cousins in OK, that I did know, and they came to the reunion for the first time also. The same goes for Larry Henderson and his wife Barb.

I did the same thing with my Dougherty side. I met right at 100 relatives in Ponca City, three years ago, and found our I have cousins in Wa. and Or., that I have become close to. The strange thing is, I really liked them all. The sad thing is, I wish the folks were alive to know that I have found all of you.

Larry is my double cousin, I guess you would say. His Gma. was Millie's daughter, Pearl. Larry's Gpa. was Dad's older brother Roy. I have shared my findings with him since I started doing this. I do the same with Bill and Karen. They are the only ones who care about our extended families, so we have fun seeing what is new.

I really hope you wanted all this that I am sending. It is fun to share and find out new things.

Did I ask you if Annie had any living Grands or greats? It would be interesting to know if they could shed any light on the Tucker family, and to see if they know about the Wallingford/Nash connection.

Myrtle was born Sept. 9, 1893, in Ky. Probably near Germantown, or Louisville, in Braken Co. She never married. She died in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Oct. 15. I do not have the year. The notes do say she had TB. I don't know where she is buried, but I am guessing it's Milwaukee.

Of course, I never met her either.

My notes are from Larry, who got them from Aunt Pearl when she was getting up there, so sometimes things are a little foggy.

CHARLEY CALBERT SCOTT

Uncle Charley was born Nov. 17, 1894, in Bracken Co., Ky. near Louisville my notes say. He died June 29, 1956. Uncle Charley was a great guy. When I was little and still lived in Ca., we used to visit him in Molalla, Oregon, where he had a filling station. Uncle Charley had 4 children by Martha Newman. When they divorced, my Mom and Dad had the two boys sent to them in Wyoming. My folks probably already had 4 kids of their own by that time, but Uncle Charley needed help. My folks were great. Charley moved to Wallace/Black Foot, Idaho area with his wife Pauline in the 50's. He was killed when the chimney at the log house he was tearing down fell on him. He left the following grown children.

1. Albert buried in Canby, Oregon
2. Charles buried in Canby, Oregon
3. Bonnie I did not know her all that well, but could still be living in Granby, Mo.

4. Naomi buried in Willamette National Cemetery, Portland. Her husband was a Marine in WW2, so he will be buried there also. The obit says Uncle Charley was sent to Granby, Mo., to be buried. This is not true. He shares a headstone with his sister, Estelle, at the Carl Junction Cemetery in C.J. Uncle Charley had such a wonderful yellow lab named Lady. He also left behind his second wife, Pauline.

PEARL ETTA SCOTT

Pearl was born Sept. 6, 1896 in Louisville, Bracken Co., Ky. Died Oct. 10, 1981. Buried in IOOF cemetery, Ponca City, Ok. Pearl married my Dad's brother, Roy Esker Dougherty, Oct. 1, 1919. Roy was born Oct. 4, 1897, near Humansville, Polk Co., Mo., and died Oct. 23, 1953, in Ponca City, Ok. He is buried with Pearl IOOF Cemetery, Ponca City, Ok. Aunt Pearl was the poorest of all poor. Her husband, the only uncle I did not like, did very little to keep the family going. Dad would get him jobs, but he just was lazy. Aunt Pearl was the most giving, loving person that you could ever know. When I little in Ca., I would go to her house and fake a coughing spell. She would say "are you getting a cold", and I would cough and nod yes. She then would send me down the dirt road to pick horehound leaves. In return, she would make me the best horehound candy in the world. Of course my cough got better. I regret not getting that recipe from her. She would always save me ribbon candy, put it in a canning jar, and give it to me for my birthday. And, no one could make apple butter like her. Again, I never got the recipe. I truly loved that woman. My African Parrot has her middle name "Etta" after Aunt Pearl.

Roy and Pearl had the following children, and they have all passed away. Diabetes and or heart trouble seemed to have hit that part of the family. 1. Millie Estelle (married Elton Henderson) born 08/29/1920 Treese, KS. This is Larry's parents. Millie was a sweet person. Not sure where buried. 2. Thomas Ellwood born 08/22/1922 in Treese, Kansas. died 04/14/1928. Uncle Roy ran over him with a log wagon. 3. Roy Esker, Jr. born 01/06/1925 in Treese, KS. died 05/20/1995 in Hamilton City, Ca. buried in Chico, Ca. Roy had a child named Douglas Dougherty whom I met when we were about 4, and in Ca. Douglas' mother was Rosemary Beard. I know he was married at least two more times and had more kids but I don't know if they were step children or not. Roy was so good to my folks. He dearly loved Mom. He used to come to Oregon to stay a spell, between marriages, and his heart was always in the right place. 4. Marlene Evelyn born 11/24/1927, Treese, KS. Died 11/11/1984, in San

Francisco, hoping to have heart surgery. She is buried in Chico, Ca. Marlene was married to Howard Sherman, and lived in Mills Orchard, Ca. They also had several kids, but I really only know Linda Jo, and have not seen her in at least twenty years. Marlene came to Ca., with Aunt Estelle for a visit, meet Howard, and that story went on. Marlene was good to her Mom, Aunt Pearl, and in return, Marlene was a good person. She used to laugh a lot, and was always perky.

5. Elmer born 02/26/1929 died 03/30/1929, Hockerville, Ok. Buried there also. Died of lung complications.
6. Letha Marie born 11/20/1931 Uncas, Ok. Letha was a sweet person. She was always a big gal. I think she weighed about 300 lbs. Mom said when Letha was a mere child she would sit in a home made rocking chair, cuddle her baby doll, and sing like an Angel for hours. Letha was married twice that I know of. She had diabetes, and that, I believe, is what killed her. She died 09/04/1976. She is also buried in Chico, Ca. I don't know how Pearl kept going. She lost so many of her kids. Of course, she was an Angel herself.
7. Charles Robert born 02/26/1933 Charles was in Ca., when I was little, but he went back to Ok., and I think I only saw him once in my adult life. I know he was married at least once, but no knowledge of children. He was good to his Mom. He was like a brother to Larry Henderson. Charles died of diabetes 11/28/1994 just 8 days after his sister Millie Estelle Henderson died.
8. Charlene born 11/26/1935, Kaw City, Ok. She died 01/01/1937 in Ponca City, Ok., of pneumonia. Was told by Mom and Larry H. that this was the final straw with Aunt Pearl. Her precious Charlene was was deathly ill, and Roy would not take her to the hospital. After that, Pearl really hated her husband. Will start again on another page.

HOBERT MCKINLEY

Hobert was born 07/10/1899, near Petersburg, Lewis Co., Ky. Affidavit that was in Aunt Estelle's records. Hobert served in WWI. He was married a couple of times, but no children. Mom said he became an alcoholic after returning from the war. However, my Dad said he was the best dyomite expert around. The companies used to chase him down to work on dams, etc. He loved cats. I remember going with Mom and Dad to see once when he lived out of Eugene, Or. He was working on a dam, and living with his last wife. I asked him what his cat's name was. He had at least two, and he said "I can't keep names straight, and I can't say cat, so they are all called KIT. Made sense to me. In his later years, he would travel from Oregon to Oklahoma and stay with his sisters. At that time there were only three of the Scott children left, and they were close. On a visit to my folks, he went out, got drunk, came home, and fell down the stairs, and broke his neck. April 15, 1974, and buried in Willamette National. He was a good brother, and a good uncle.

The meds screwed up my blood count, and I hit rock bottom again a month ago, started taking half meds, and now I am feeling alive again. I am not as bad off as most people that take the meds, so I don't complain. I do complain about having to go get my blood drawn every

week. I am starting to get some energy back, but for almost a year, I have been sleeping 32 hours a day, or so it seemed. Ron and the boys have been great thru this. I also have Jesse's cub scout group that are wonderful to bring dinner once in awhile, take Jesse to meetings, etc. The other boy's friend's parents are good about taking and picking up at games, dances, or whatever. I would not wish this illness on my worst enemy. I was the only kid in the family to be born in a hospital, and the Dr. seems to think Mom got the virus there, and was a carrier. It took all these years to come out in me. However, Mom was treated for leukemia, and now I wonder if she didn't really have the virus. We'll never know. But Mom never stopped going. I also had a transfusion, and it could have come from there. I just want to feel good all the time and have energy.

Ron is a retired truck driver. He was a fireman, but loved driving truck. He was also in the Navy.

We had plans of traveling also, but things did change a little. We love the boys so much, but it would be nice if we got child support.

Last summer, I did not feel like going on a trip. We want to go to North Dakota this coming summer to see where the Hoffas family came from, and then on to Mo. However, I don't know if we can afford it. It is not cheap keeping the boys fed, clothed, etc. I would love to make it to your reunion. It would really be a highlight of my life. I guess we'll just have to see if next summer will bring fun and money.

I also think meeting all of you would be so much fun. We could have a great time.

You know, things are kinda funny. I have two step children like I said. They are Nicholas, age 45, and the father of our three grandsons. Kristi Lynn is Ron's Daughter, and she is 43. We also have 7 grandchildren that range from 8 to 19.

I so much want to go to Houston to visit Bill and Karen also. Of course, I would love to have you all up here.

Just a quick note. My Dad worked on blasting out the passage somewhere heading up to Alaska,

It was formerly the old school house attended by my father which burned about two years ago. I am also enclosing a rough map of the graves of my ancestors. I think it is unique that my father (mom is still living), all four grandparents, six great-grandparents, and two gr-gr-grandparents are buried in this one little place. People did not move around much in the old days. Plots are still sold to descendants - ours cost a big \$300 each with perpetual care. The cemetery association holds a barbeque fundraiser each July 4th.

Admiral Dewey Daugherty Jr was my husband's father. No he was not an admiral but he was in the Navy. Joyce has the story on how they got their names. I thought I still had the information in the computer but must have printed and deleted. I am bad about printing and then deleting and then trying to locate again. I am like you, I have so much information and really don't know where to start entering. We have traced my side of the family back with way over 2500 names so really have a lot to enter.

I live in Campbell County. It is above Pendleton County which is right above Bracken County.

As far as Henson being the right name, I am not 100% sure of that. I am saying that it is a

coincidence that there was a marriage in Bracken County in 1860 around the same time as Abner was

this is a good connection.

I was sent a whole file of things from a gentleman, I don't even remember who he was now. Isn't

with this email, granted I don't forget it. I have a few things underlined and italicized, just a

couple of marriages, but that is all I have gotten from this. I will send the whole thing anyway,

Just for you to see what it is. This is all that this guy had.

I see that you are Millie's great granddughter, right?

I would be Jeff's great granddughter.

Would love to share what I have, but I don't really have much. I am stuck with finding out stuff on

Jeff. I only know that his fathers name is William from one of the certificates that I seen. Not

sure which one now. Never knew the mothers name. I still can't find Jeff's wife. She died fairly

young. Her and George, her son that was in WWI both died young. He was 26, we don't know her age.

It is said to me that she died when my great grandfather was only 12, so that would put it about

1909, before Ky. death records were kept. Don't even know where she is buried. He remarried later,

but don't know when. Married a Carrie ?. I can place them in Portsmouth, Ohio around 1918 because

of the birth of one of their children. Portsmouth is basically across the river from Bracken

County.

These Tucker's are definitely elusive. I have had trouble with them since day one. I have only been working on this for about 2 years off and on. But, still, they have been difficult to find. Jeff's family is definitely a hard one. From stories that I have heard and been told, we don't know if he wasn't a good father, or didn't know how to take care of children after his wife died, but he sold one daughter, another, I have a name for, don't know where I got it now. No one has ever even heard of her. Don't know if she died young as well, or if he sold her or adopted her out or what. Haven't been able to find anything else. This is definitely all a bit confusing. Hope the holiday was fun for you. Karen and Billy went to cemetery and took pictures. Karen said there was a grave between Annie and Thomas. I said I would ask you, or she could e-mail you. I also said none of us would do much till after the holidays. Also, we cannot find, in any of your papers who the Loyd's are. Is that name on your Mother's side?

When Karen and Bill were at the cemetery over the weekend, they said a person was out there sand blasting a head stone (Wallingford) near Annie. This person passed away on Nov. 25, 2002, and his present wife was saying he died on the 24th. Anyway, that is what the blaster was telling Karen and Billy. I guess he is being buried beside his first wife.

I started by asking about Annie on the net. She has been like a fixation to me. I heard her name mentioned from Aunt Pearl, and mentioned with love, I had to find her, or what happened to her.

I found a lady on the net by the name of Faye WALKER, (faywalker@aol.com), who had info printed on Oliver Nash. I believe it was the LDS site. I have Oliver Nash, born 1866, Lewis Co., Ky. written with my Scott's on family Bible sheet. She said that Oliver married Ida Belle Beckett in Fleming Co. Ida Beckett's father was John Wallingford Beckett. (note---Oliver Nash's mother, Nancy Nash, was Nancy Wallingford before her marriage.

George W. Tucker age 25 married Avarilla Browning age 18, both born in Bracken County. 29 May 1897 Geo. W. Tucker and H. Browning, secs; J.B. Beckett attest to MGML m. Bird Hughes; m. at Jeff Tucker's; C.K. Hill and George Fowle wit father of groom born Bracken, mother of groom born Bracken father and mother of bride also born in Bracken. MRB#3 1890-1938 page 54.

As you can figure up, being the age of 25 in 1897 makes him born around the year of 1872. The census info that you sent me has his birth around 1873, and you said that you knew of errors because of Millie's date.

This is the only information that I have to go on for George W. Tucker, but it is something to work with at least.

Glad to hear from you. I like talking to others working on the Tucker's. Haven't found anyone, until I found Joyce, that was working on this same line. It is about time. I have been working slowly, for about a year now, and have come to find that these Tucker's are pretty elusive people! I will try my best to interpret the marriage license of George Tucker. As far as the MRB #3, that refers to the book, this is how it was listed when I found it in a book at the library. I of course, didn't write the name of the book down, not sure if this was anything at the time. How stupid! But, the book at the library was referring to where this person found it at in Bracken County, so, I would think it would mean Marriage Record Book # 3. As for the MGML, I wrote it like it was wrote in the book, and I have no clue either. I assume the ML would be Marriage License? Again, all the abbreviations were in this particular book. The m. Bird Hughes...this is the man who married the two. The secs; I am not sure, but wasn't there something in this time period like a security type of thing, someone who secured the marriage? I don't know, but the word I am trying to think of, but have drawn a blank, is either securer or something along those lines. I am not even sure how to spell the thing. Maybe I will think of it later. The m. at is Married At, and the wit is Witness. Hope this helps and makes sense to you.

As far as Joyce sending things to me, the only things that I have received from her is a couple of census'. Other than her telling me a small bit about her family, how related to William, etc. I don't have much either. I was and am stuck on William. I only knew his name because of it being listed on Jeff's death certificate. His mother's name wasn't. I am having a hard time trying to find information on Jeff. He had a son in W.W. I that I have and am trying to find info on. That is why this George was of interest to me. First, being married at Jeff's home raised suspicions, but Jeff also had a son named George. He died young and don't think he ever married. He is the one that was in the war.

I told Joyce that I am considering a trip to Bracken County next week. I am pretty busy with Christmas baking, etc., and have 2 small boys, so it is a challenge to even get to work on this family stuff! But, anyway, if I get to go, it would be next Friday or Sat. that is the only 2 days they are open for research. And short hours too! If you have anything in particular that you would like me to search for, I will. I will let you and Joyce both know sometime next week if I will get to go. The weather here hasn't been very predictable lately. They called 2 weeks ago for 2-4 inches of snow and we ended up with 7, just had a small ice storm come through a couple of days ago, rain today changing to snow tonight. Have heard 1-2 inches, and 1-4 inches. So, it is a guess to anyone on how much we get!!!

Here is what I know about Jefferson Davis Tucker.
Born about 1870-1873. His marriage cert. states he was born in Bracken County, but the death cert. of his son George states father was born in Robertson County. Let's remember though that Robertson County was formed from Bracken County. Jeff married Ida Lu Groves November 30, 1892, in Bracken County at Frank Groves' home. This could possibly be Ida's father. We don't know too much about her. She died in 1909, or there about. The only information in my great grandmothers Bible was "Grandpa Groves." Not much help. The marriage cert. says her father's name is G. F. Groves. Any how, as I said, Ida died pretty young which left Jeff with 4 children to raise. Apparently, he wasn't able and/or willing (we aren't sure, so we can only speculate)! At some point, he sold one of his daughters, mind you, for a cow. There was another daughter that no one knows about. We have come across her name, not sure where now, but no one had ever heard of her. Then, he had 2 sons. George Tucker was one of them. My great grandmother said that he was in W.W.I. I do have a picture of him in uniform. I was told that he was gassed in the war and as a result, later died. I have found his death cert. and it states he died of Tuberculosis. There isn't a lot of useful information on the death cert. I guess it could be useful, I just have to solve the puzzle. His cert. states he was single, born in 1896, no other dates listed, he was a farmer, born in Robertson County, father Jeff, mother Ida, died Mar 5, 1921. The informant who signed the death cert. was someone in Ida's family. The first name isn't legible on the copy I have. But, it is definitely a Groves. I was told he was buried in Bracken County. Don't know where. I have looked in books of cemeteries and have yet to find him. The informant lived in Brooksville. His place of death says his voting pct. was Milford. The place of burial or removal says Foster Swope, undertaker was Bratton Swope. I have had someone tell me that this was an undertaker "shop," and not the name of any funeral home or cemetery. Since I have not been able to find him in cemetery books, it leads me to believe he probably doesn't have a headstone. Jeff doesn't. Back to Jeff...
For a while, I do know that he lived in Bracken County. My great grandmother would make a visit to "Augusta" several times. I was too young to remember, I guess. I don't remember ever hearing of it. So, I don't know if he lived in Augusta or someone else. I have also been told of Germantown, Brooksville, Maysville, Mt. Olivet. They are all in the same areas basically. Sounds like with that much moving, they probably never "owned" their own home. At some point Jeff remarried. I believe to a woman named Carrie. He had 2 other sons with her. I do know one was born in Portsmouth, Ohio. Right across the river from Bracken and Mason Counties. That was in 1918. I never knew any of Jeff's children. My great grandfather died pretty young, 20 years before I was born. My father was even too young to remember him. My parents still live in the house he built (my great grandfather, Jeff's son).
In 1937, the year the Ohio River flooded, severely, Jeff was living in Bracken County. I was told that one of his sons living in Latonia, Kenton County, Ky. went and picked up and he lived with him for a bit. He ended up passing away while there. This was in 1937. His age was I believe the cert said 64. My grandmother has it. The only information that I can recall being on it was his fathers name was William. It did not have a mothers name. I don't recall who was the informant. Jeff is buried in Linden Grove Cemetery in Covington, Kenton County, Ky. I was there. It was a nightmare! The place was a mess. There was a new caretaker that had just taken over and promised me it would get much better. It was cold and sleeting and snowing when I visited and they were still out working. So, that is a good thing, I guess. I haven't been back just yet. I plan to go when it gets warm again. This man didn't know the layout of the cemetery very well. Couldn't really find the area very well. Some of it was even under water. But, I walked the whole area and never found a stone, so he too probably don't have one. I looked quickly in the book, and so did the caretaker, and we didn't see any other Tucker's there, none that looked like they would fit in my line anyway. I assume Ida is buried in Bracken County. But have no idea. As for Carrie, I don't know that either, I can't even find a death cert on her.

That is about all I know about them. I said it wasn't much, but I keep on digging. It's more than I had a year ago!
Hope this helps us piece them all together. I still keep looking for George W. Tucker and Avarilla Browning also. Hopefully, soon, I will find some more.
